



KS3 Curriculum Overview - Citizenship

Your child's Citizenship education will develop the knowledge, skills and understanding that they need to play a full part in democratic society, as active and informed citizens. Pupils are taught about democracy, politics, parliament and voting. Additionally they learn about human rights, justice, the law, identities and diversity. Topics such as media and information literacy, climate change and sustainability, financial and economic education and the role of the UK in the wider world are also included.
