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Through the study of Latin, your child will be expected to develop the following knowledge, skills and understanding:

Latin Language	Latin Literature	Roman Civilisation
- Know the words in the list specified by the exam board, and recognise them in different forms - Be able to translate stories and passages from Latin to English - Be able to identify aspects of Latin grammar	- Know the texts in the source material provided by the exam board - Be able to write analytically about the techniques used by the writers - Be able to write a balanced response to a question about the material as a whole	- Be able to recall facts about Roman family life, including information about the family unit, childhood, education, marriage, death and religion. - Be able to make comparisons between aspects of Roman and modern family life

Parents can support their child by:

- Encouraging them to learn vocabulary using the myCLC platform or Quizlet at least 3 times a week for 15 minutes at a time;
- Encouraging them to access the revision resources on Google Classroom;
- (If you have the chance) visiting Roman sites such as Verulamium (St Albans) or London's Mithraeum;
- Encouraging them to watch films and/or read books that deal with the Roman Empire (see Google Classroom for suggested titles).
